Years ago no one spoke of mental health. It was unheard of for people to discuss mental health outside of a medical facility. However times have changed, and it is no longer taboo to discuss mental health; the conversation is crucial to the entire population. There are obvious signs that you see and hear. However, the questions asked are not inclusive enough to pinpoint the issues you may be experiencing or that you are witnessing. Not all mental health issues are visible. There are silent symptoms you cannot see or hear and many people suffer in silence.

Mental health issues can be disguised and very hard to detect. It is necessary to be observant in actions, conversations and in the quietness of individuals. When we ask the questions "how are you?" or "are you ok?' we have to make sure that while we give people space, we pay attention to other clues to make sure that they are taking care of their mental health.

Many different circumstances require different approaches when discussing and diagnosing mental health conditions. Depression, bipolar, defiant behavior, eating disorder, paranoia, post-traumatic syndrome disorder are only a few mental disorders that are prevalent in our society.

The Fayetteville Police Department deals with many issues on a daily basis. From occupational stress (sworn or non-sworn employees and family members) to home life issues and for some, their faith, we all go through a lot. As a Chaplain, I must understand mental health and the systemic issues that are present in the department. With the training I have received and the day-to-day living, I understand personally the effect it can have on others and me if we don't take care of ourselves, both physically and mentally.

Training in mental health is imperative. In-person training, online training, clergy counseling and much more are available today. We cannot shy away from the issue. We have many tools available within the department to assist in crisis or most preferable, before.


